Spencer Carlin is recognized tonight as Troop 4's 22nd Eagle Scout. Spencer began his scouting career in 2003 with Troop 4. He joined a young patrol that included fellow Eagle Scouts Mike Tusino and Patrick Bedard. Despite not having any Cub Scout experience, Spencer immediately excelled at Boy Scouts. The fact that his small patrol produced three Eagle Scouts (Scouting's highest rank) is a testament to their commitment to the Scout Oath and Law, and the Patrol Method. Spencer's favorite part of Boy Scouts has been the troop's outdoor activities. Among the activities that stand out include the famous Troop 4 pig roast campout. At one of these pig roasts, Spencer organized a successful obstacle course that was a favorite among the young Webelos recruits. He also enjoyed the Troop's whitewater trips, and snowmobiling at the annual New Hampshire Winter Sports Weekend at the Lanciano family cabin.

A highlight of Spencer's scouting career was his participation in the Troop's high adventure canoe trip on the remote lakes and rivers of New York's Adirondack Park. This trip was a scout let expedition, and included 50 miles of paddling and challenging portages through the wilderness. He fondly recalls the natural water slide the troop discovered, where he and his fellow scouts slid 50 yards into a swirling river pool. On this adventure, Spencer was presented with the Honor Camper award, for outstanding scout spirit and leadership. The award also included an amazing walking staff, on which Mr. Sutherland hand carved detailed images of the adventure throughout the week.

He also worked part time with a remodeling contractor. Spencer is active with his church, where he has participated in several construction projects, some abroad, to help the needy.
