Eric joined Scouting with Pack 67. Eric's best Cub Scout memories were the overnight on the U.S.S. Massachusetts, the overnight at the New England Aquarium, and the annual Pinewood Derby. He earned Cub Scout's highest award, the Arrow of Light, after which he joined Troop 4. Eric was the only Cub Scout from his den to join Troop 4.
