Mark joined Scouting as a Pack 4 Tiger Cub in 2011. His den, led by Mr. Mandile, was very active with many adventures for the group. As a Cub Scout, Mark fondly remembers the Battleship Cove overnight adventure. Mark earned Cub Scout's highest award, the Arrow of Light, after which he joined Troop 4 in 2016.

Mark's favorite activities with Troop 4 were attending the camping and high adventure trips. Mark admits that there were so many special experiences in his Troop 4 career, that he cannot choose a

favorite, but the most memorable are the trips to Carter Notch, the trek out to Tahosa in Colorado, the Maryland/ Hershey Park trip in 2018 and the Maine High Adventure 50-mile canoe trip in 2019.

Mark is also involved in the Sons of Italy and graduated as a member of the National Honor Society and Science National Honor Society. Mark has worked at McDonalds and Casey Pool. Working at McDonalds taught him the importance of working effectively as a team. "The goal was to take orders, cash out, and give the customer their food in under 2 minutes and for this to be possible there is a lot of teamwork involved, with everyone having an important role to play." In the fall, Mark will be attending Boston University, where he hopes to major in Biology with a specialization in cell biology.

Mark's advice to the younger Scouts: "Take advantage of all of the opportunities you are presented with, like campouts and meetings, while you are younger because your schedule will get messier as you grow up."
